

Performance Goals & Measurements:

GOALS OF THE NPC

Following its successful participation in the relicensing process for the New York Power Authority's Niagara Power Project that led to the 2005 Host Community Relicensing Settlement Agreement and, later, to the approval of a new license for the Project in 2007, the Niagara Power Coalition, Inc. initially focused on assuring that its members received from the Power Authority the direct benefits to which they were entitled under the Settlement Agreement, namely, their respective allocations of funding and low-cost electric power. Subsequently, and on an on-going basis, the Coalition has focused on the three goals identified in the Mission Statement: (1) providing administrative support to the Host Communities Standing Committee in its allocation of the Greenway Recreation/Tourism Fund in the amount of \$3 million annually; (2) serving as a forum for the Standing Committee members, other than the Power Authority, to address common issues pertaining to the Greenway Fund (*e.g.*, actions of the Niagara River Greenway Commission); and (3) following current developments regarding the Power Authority and the Niagara Power Project that can have an effect on the Coalition's members and their constituents (*e.g.*, Power Authority rates and allocations of power).

MEASUREMENT STANDARDS

1. Support of Host Communities Standing Committee: Does the Coalition provide the necessary support for the Standing Committee to be able to carry out its allocation of funding? If so, is that support being provided in a timely, efficient and effective manner? If not, what improvements are necessary?
2. Forum for Addressing Common Issues: Does the Coalition provide a forum for its members to deal with Greenway-related issues affecting the common interests of members of the Standing Committee other than the Power Authority? If so, is the forum adequate? If not, how can it be made so?
3. Following Current Developments: Does the Coalition assist its members in staying abreast of current developments regarding the Power Authority and/or the Niagara Power Project that may affect their common interests? If so, is such assistance adequate? If not, what changes are necessary to provide adequate assistance?
